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# ILUMYA® AND MEDICARE PART B

## YOUR CHOICE OF MEDICARE PLAN AFFECTS YOUR TREATMENT

Choosing a Medicare plan can be confusing. It's important to think about your overall medical care to find the right plan for you and check if your insurance plan covers your medication.

There are 2 types of Medicare plans: Original Medicare and Medicare Advantage. Traditional Medicare plans have Medicare Parts A and B—and a person can add Part D for prescription drug coverage. Medicare Part B, with a supplement, helps pay for injections or infusions, like ILUMYA® (tildrakizumab-asmn), that are administered in-office by a healthcare provider. Most people with Medicare Part B coverage and a supplement could pay \$0\* for ILUMYA®.

Medicare Advantage, or Part C, is an alternative to Original Medicare. However, under Medicare Advantage plans, some medically administered drugs like injectables or biologics may *not* be covered, or may have special requirements or coverage limits. So, it's important to check your coverage before enrollment deadlines and determine if it's necessary to switch plans.

### Here are 3 things to consider when choosing a Medicare plan that supports your treatment for moderate-to-severe plaque psoriasis:

- Does your doctor accept this type of Medicare plan?
- Which type of Medicare plan covers your moderate-to-severe plaque psoriasis treatment (Part B or Part D)?
- What is your potential copay based on your Medicare plan?

## WHEN CAN I ENROLL?

Medicare coverage generally starts when you turn 65.

### Signing up at age 65:

#### Initial Enrollment Period (IEP)

It lasts for 7 months, starting 3 months before you turn 65. Enrollment ends 3 months after the month you turn 65. The date your coverage starts depends on which month you sign up during your IEP. Coverage always starts on the first of the month.

### If you choose not to sign up at age 65:

#### Special Enrollment Period (SEP)

These are specific periods when you can enroll in Medicare after your IEP ends. This is typically when you have employer coverage that ends due to retirement, cost, or personal choice. An SEP is only available for a limited time. If you don't sign up during your SEP, you'll have to wait for the next General Enrollment Period, and you might have to pay a late-enrollment penalty.

### If you fail to enroll at age 65 or during the SEP:

#### General Enrollment Period (GEP)

This is an annual period during which you can enroll in Medicare if you fail to enroll during your IEP or an SEP. You can sign up between January 1 and March 31 each year. Your coverage starts the month after you sign up.

### Each year during Open Enrollment, you can check your Medicare coverage and decide whether to keep your current plan or make changes

Open Enrollment is typically mid-October through early December for coverage that starts on January 1 of the following year.

It is possible to switch from one type of Medicare plan to another, but only during specific periods. For more information about plans and enrollment dates, visit [Medicare.gov](https://www.Medicare.gov) or call 1-800-MEDICARE (1-800-633-4227).

### Did you know that most people with Medicare Part B coverage could pay \$0 for ILUMYA®\*?

Medicare Part B helps pay for services needed to administer prescriptions—like infusions or injections. Because ILUMYA® can only be administered by a healthcare professional, it's covered under Medicare Part B with a supplement. Medicare Part B coverage has a 20% cost share for ILUMYA®, but with supplemental insurance, your prescription may be covered in full.

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## What is ILUMYA®?

ILUMYA® (tildrakizumab-asmn) is a prescription medicine used to treat adults with moderate to severe plaque psoriasis who may benefit from taking injections, pills (systemic therapy), or phototherapy (treatment using ultraviolet or UV light).

## IMPORTANT SAFETY INFORMATION

### What is the most important information I should know about ILUMYA®?

**Do not use ILUMYA®** if you have had a severe allergic reaction to ILUMYA® or any of its ingredients.

**Get emergency medical help right away if you get any of the following symptoms of a serious allergic reaction:**

- feel faint
- trouble breathing or throat tightness
- swelling of your face, eyelids, lips, mouth, tongue or throat
- chest tightness
- skin rash

ILUMYA® is a medicine that may lower the ability of your immune system to fight infections and may increase your risk of infections. Your healthcare provider should check you for infections and tuberculosis (TB) before starting treatment with ILUMYA® and may treat you for TB before you begin treatment with ILUMYA® if you have a history of TB or have active TB. Your healthcare provider should watch you closely for signs and symptoms of TB during and after treatment with ILUMYA®.

Tell your healthcare provider right away if you have an infection or have symptoms of an infection, including:

- fever, sweats, or chills
- muscle aches
- weight loss
- cough
- warm, red, or painful skin or sores on your body different from your psoriasis
- diarrhea or stomach pain
- shortness of breath
- burning when you urinate or urinating more often than normal
- blood in your phlegm (mucus)

**Before receiving ILUMYA®, tell your healthcare provider about all of your medical conditions, including if you:**

- have any of the conditions or symptoms listed in the section “What is the most important information I should know about ILUMYA®?”
- have an infection that does not go away or that keeps coming back
- have TB or have been in close contact with someone with TB
- recently received or are scheduled to receive a vaccine (immunization). You should avoid receiving live vaccines during treatment with ILUMYA®.
- are pregnant or plan to become pregnant. It is not known if ILUMYA® can harm your unborn baby.
- are breastfeeding or plan to breastfeed. It is not known if ILUMYA® passes into your breast milk.

**Tell your healthcare provider about all the medicines you take**, including prescription and over-the-counter medicines, vitamins, and herbal supplements.

It is not known if ILUMYA® is safe and effective in children under 18 years of age.

### What are the possible side effects of ILUMYA®?

**ILUMYA® may cause serious side effects. See “What is the most important information I should know about ILUMYA®?”**

The most common side effects of ILUMYA® include: upper respiratory infections, injection site reactions and diarrhea. These are not all of the possible side effects of ILUMYA®. Call your doctor for medical advice about side effects.
